(The Confession of 1967)

By humble submission to John's baptism, Christ joined himself to humans in their need and entered upon his ministry of reconciliation in the power of the spirit. Christian baptism marks the receiving of the same Spirit by all his people. Baptism with water represents not only cleansing from sin but a dying with Christ and a joyful rising with him to new life. It commits all Christians to die each day to sin and to live for righteousness. In baptism the church celebrates the renewal of the covenant with which God has bound God's people to God's own self. By baptism, individuals are publicly received into the church to share in its life and ministry, and the church becomes responsible for their training and support in Christian discipleship. When those baptized are infants, the congregation, as well as the parents, has a special obligation to nurture them in the Christian life, leading them to make, by a public profession, a personal response to the love of God shown forth in their baptism. Amen.

This text based on Jesus' Great Commission (Matthew 28:19–20) emphasizes that engaging in mission according to the model of Christ's life and ministry inspires service rather than conquest. The gospel message is a gift of life and hope made known in healing, justice, and peace.

Acts 8: 9-13

Now a certain man named Simon had previously practiced magic in the city and amazed the people of Samaria, saying that he was someone great. All of them, from the least to the greatest, listened to him eagerly, saying, "This man is the power of God that is called Great." And they listened eagerly to him because for a long time he had amazed them with his magic. But when they believed Philip, who was proclaiming the good news about the kingdom of God and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized, both men and women. Even Simon himself believed. After being baptized, he stayed constantly with Philip and was amazed when he saw the signs and great miracles that took place

Isaiah 43: 1-7

But now thus says the Lord, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. ²When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through fire you shall not be burned, and the flame shall not consume you. ³For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Savior. I give Egypt as your ransom, Ethiopia and Seba in exchange for you. ⁴Because you are precious in my sight, and honored, and I love you, I give people in return for you, nations in exchange for your life. ⁵Do not fear, for I am with you; I will bring your offspring from the east, and from the west I will gather you; ⁶I will say to the north, "Give them up," and to the south, "Do not withhold; bring my sons from far away and my daughters from the end of the earth— ⁷everyone who is called by my name, whom I created for my glory, whom I formed and made."

Baptismal Reflection

During our preaching series on baptism, each week a member will share a baptismal reflection. This week, we read Connor Callaway's reflections:

Several years ago, I woke up one day in a cold sweat. I rushed to my parents' room with newfound haste, which I hadn't known since the days of my youth. It was early in the morning; my mom and dad hadn't even gotten out of bed yet. I shook them awake and asked, "Why don't we go to church?" Both of my parents responded with "We have tried several churches in the area, son, and they just don't seem to fit." I sat there disappointed and begged them time and time again with determination only possibly seeded by the Lord in heaven. I remember my dad finally caving and suggested that we try going to the church he grew up going to. With that suggestion from her beloved, my mom's stubborn nature gave in and finally she admitted saying: "Okay we'll give it a shot!" That is the story of how we're here and a part of this wonderful congregation and how I can live and walk a life with those that share my similar passions, a gift no short of a miracle.

Not even a year after us joining I rushed to talk to my pastors and my parents. I just knew that the next best step for me was to be baptized, I didn't even know it was part of the joining process at that time. That day when I walked up to the font with Pastor Richard watching as I grew into a new spiritual existence was nothing short of heavenly. I felt a new overwhelming sense of pride, not one of the flesh but rather pride of the father. I was part of the church, part of his body, part of his people. That was the best feeling one could ask for. As I walked around looking at my new brothers, sisters, mothers, and fathers I was beyond overjoyed, and far more terrified than I could describe. I was not only walking through a new crowd of strangers but also into a new life entirely. Yet, something in my gut told me that it was all for the best and that feeling of confidence is what has kept me going all my life. This month's preaching seriously reignited that feeling, the one of confidence and power that I had been blessed with several years ago, and I pray that everyone both in and out of our congregation will be guided to being claimed by the light of the Lord. For such a feeling is ineffable in beauty, and brings about indescribable happiness.
