HOW TO BECOME A MEMBER

Membership at St. Andrew is the first step in what we consider a life-long process of discipleship, and we invite you to join us on this journey. Becoming a member affirms your faith in God and love for God's people. Membership is a commitment to this particular part of God's family, where we nurture growth in faith, worship, and service to others. We receive new members in one of the following ways: Letter of Transfer (can be requested by our church office), Reaffirmation of Faith, or Profession of Faith and Baptism.
- 3. Be welcomed in worship on a future Sunday when we recognize our new members.

VOLUNTEER WITH THE TREEHOUSE

The Treehouse After School Program is a mission of the congregation of St. Andrew, commissioned to provide affordable after school care for children who qualify for free/reduced lunch within the Denton ISD. Fourteen children are picked up after school each day from three elementary schools. These children spend their afternoons in the rec center at St. Andrew enjoying a nutritious snack, help with homework, playtime in the gym, arts and crafts, science experiments, and fun with each other. The Treehouse provides a safe, family atmosphere where parents know that their children are loved, respected, and well cared for

The Treehouse and its director are dependent on our volunteers in order for the program to be its best each day. The ways you can help include:

Afternoon Volunteer—1-2 people are needed each day to assist the director in preparing for the children's arrival, serving snacks, homework help, and general supervision. These volunteers are needed from 2:30-5:30. Volunteers can be scheduled on a regular day each week, a regular day each month, or on an as-needed basis. Volunteers are required to pass a background check.

Snack Volunteer—In order to keep the program budget as low as possible, daily snacks are provided by volunteers. These volunteers are given specific dates when their snacks will be needed, usually 2-3 times each semester, and a snack suggestion list—no cooking required. Snacks can be delivered to the rec center any time before 2:30 on the day they are needed, including the Sunday prior to that date.
